Walter Chepman and St Giles
In Walter Chepman's time, St Giles
Collegiate Church of Edinburgh was
somewhat different from the
Presbyterian Church that we call St
Giles Cathedral today. However the
Chapel to St John he had built with the
proceeds of printing and trade still



remains almost as it would have been 500 years ago when he was buried there. He has more recently had to share the space with Duke of Montrose but he has at least a plaque of his own on the wall, placed there

by William Chambers in 1879, on the completion of his renovation of the Church, probably the only existing memorial to Chepman.

The 500th anniversary itself In the week ending 4 April a series of events marked the 500th anniversary of printing in Scotland. Dundee Central Library's exhibition, Dei Donum - celebrating 500 years of printing in Scotland and learning in Dundee, opened on Monday 31 March. The Mitchell Library in Glasgow put their copy of 'Blind Harry's Wallace', printed by Chepman and Myllar, on display as April's 'Treasure of the month'.



On 1 April, Publishing Scotland held a massive 'Book Swap' in Adam House in Chambers Street, in Edinburgh.



On Thursday 3 April, a modern press, operated by Heidelberg UK was sited at

Glasgow Metropolitan College and then moved on to Princes Street in Edinburgh, near the National Galleries, the following day. The public was able to see two-tone A3 posters being printed, and take samples away with them.

On the 500th anniversary of its printing, the National Library of Scotland displayed the only known surviving copy of The Complaint of the Black Knight to the public. Also on 4 April,

Councillor Donald Wilson of the City of Edinburgh Council unveiled a plaque in the Cowgate near the site of Chepman and Myllar's press.



In Dundee, a public day of printing was held at Dundee Contemporary Arts, entitled First Edition: 500 Years of Print in Scotland. Some of the results can be viewed on the website created that day www.500years.co.uk A celebratory dinner, hosted by the Centre for the History of the Book at the University of Edinburgh, was held in the evening, in the Playfair Library Hall, Old College. Magnus Linklater, as Guest of Honour, spoke about the the technology changes in of newspaper production during lifetime, from hot metal to modern high-speed offset litho.
